# Update 014

**Headlines:** As of today, Wednesday, June 25, 2025, the strategic situation in the Strait of Hormuz and broader Middle East shows signs of improvement there has been no strikes in the past 24-hours with all parties abiding to a ceasefire. Commercial maritime traffic continues to flow through the SoH with a surge of traffic on 24 June, up 30% from 23 June. There remains no impact to commercial shipping; however, due to the fragility of the ceasefire agreement **the maritime domain threat remains ELEVATED.** 

Noteworthy is the reaction of the Houthis; who on 23 June signaled their intention to end the ceasefire with the U.S. in support of Iranian retaliatory strikes. As of 0900UTC on 25 June, there have been no further updates. Historically, the Houthis announce publicly their intent.

## The Situation:

- **Hostilities:** No activity in the past 24-hours.
- **Electronic Interference:** Persistently high levels of electronic interference, particularly affecting GNSS systems, continue to be experienced throughout many parts of the region.
- Threat of SoH Closure: The SoH remains open and traffic flow appears normal.

#### JMIC recommends industry:

**Maintain Elevated Security Posture:** Continue to adhere to BMP-MS and security advisories (e.g., Flag, JMIC, UKMTO, MSCIO).

**Conduct Thorough Threat and Risk Assessments:** Perform detailed, vessel-specific, voyage-specific and activity specific risk assessments for any operations or transit through the region, particularly the Strait of Hormuz, Arabian Gulf, and Red Sea.

Ensure Robust Contingency Planning: Have clear, and rehearsed plans for, emergency response, crew

welfare, and communication in the event of renewed escalation or incident.

**Maintain Vigilant Lookouts:** Employ enhanced visual lookouts and rely more heavily on visual, radar-based navigation, especially given the prevalence of electronic interference.

**Stay Informed:** Continuously monitor credible intelligence sources and official government channels for real-time updates, as the situation can change rapidly.




Fig 1. GNSS Interference Map 24<sup>nd</sup> June (source: gpsjam.org)

 Historical average in June of 2024 was 114 vessels transiting the SoH daily. The figures below for June 2025 show consistency in the Strait of Hormuz traffic divided into East- and West transit.
